Their duties included:-

- Recruiting volunteers for fostering
- Setting up fosterers with equipment to house rescue kittens and cats
- Liaising and providing support to the fosterers
- Carrying out health assessments with the cats and kittens
- Arranging veterinary appointments for treatments eg: desexing, vaccines and any other treatments or injuries
- Ordering and arranging delivery and distribution of cat food, litter and supplies

- Screening potential homes/people for adoption of cats and kittens. Including processing of relevant paperwork
- Trapping and collecting rescue cats and kittens and transporting to fosterer's or to the vets
- Daily feeding programs for the colony cats

Their commitment and dedication has gained the respect of myself, the volunteers and the Queenstown Community. Therefore I have no hesitation in recommending them and fully support them in their new venture in establishing a Rescue organisation called QT CATs.

Congratulations on coming together in such a short space of time to establish QT CATs. This achievement is particularly impressive given the difficulties surrounding Covid-19 Lockdown restrictions. This in itself is testament to your passion, determination, drive, and ability to make things happen according to your purpose.

That you have formed your charity, having foreseen the difficulties and hardships that individuals/families may face during these unprecedented times, and the potential impact to the beloved family cat, is particularly relevant at this time.

The importance of The Cat to its human family is well documented, so we will not comment further, suffice to say the stress and sadness felt when these relationships are broken, for whatever reason, is very real.

CRW have had in their care cats that have obviously been family pets, but remained unclaimed, despite advertising. We suspect some have been dumped or abandoned, others may have strayed from home. For some people, microchipping is overlooked due to the additional cost, but this would have helped for these cats, and several others we have spent time on to reunite with their owners. We have also had litters of kittens surrendered to us, as people hadn't desexed their cat in time, with a lack of finances and understanding of early age desexing being implicated in these instances. And for those who are isolated from society for whatever reason, but love their cat, having someone to support them if they are unable to do all they need, will make a very real difference to the health and well-being of both cat and human. An organisation such as QT CATs that is able to educate, offer advice, or financial and practical support, would help to prevent the kind of unfortunate situations where cats find themselves surrendered, homeless, or abandoned. This makes the community a better place for all.

Many of us on the CRW committee have known one or more of the QT CATs ladies for the last three or so years, when we first started doing cat rescue work in Wanaka. We have appreciated their considerable experience and knowledge, their commitment and dedication, their compassionate understanding of situations, and willingness to share and offer help.

QT CATs – we wish you all the best in your mission. You have found an unmet need in society in endeavouring to be the fence at the top of the cliff. Kia kaha – be strong.

Prospective Supporters – we trust our letter of support speaks for itself.

I am writing in support of Queenstown Community Cats and the valuable work they do to support the community and the local cats. Covid-19 has had a huge impact for people financially and many people have had to consider the horrible thought of having to give up their pets. As an owner of three cats myself the thought of having to do this is heart breaking. They are a part of my family and I believe hugely beneficial to my child in his learning of compassion and care. I have been fortunate that our family have managed financially through this period of time but I am aware many others haven't and having this organisation to help has been crucial. Part of their assistance includes helping with desexing, reducing the numbers of cats being abandoned and the population of wild cats. I personally believe this assists conservation efforts for the New Zealand wildlife.

Out with this they have supported our resident's previously at Bupa with pet therapy. Coming into care can be a huge adjustment for them and their families and can be very difficult. Animals and children can have a huge impact on the mental wellbeing and I have seen this many times when they have brought cats into visit. One particular occasion was a resident at end of life who was very distressed. As soon as a cat was placed beside him he settled, the cat didn't leave his side and he passed away peaceful. This gave the family so much peace seeing this change. We now have two cats at the home and it is incredible to see their instincts when residents are at end of life and the comfort they bring them and their family. Many residents have bowls of food in their rooms and enjoy the companionship and the way it makes it feel more like home. They particularly love when QT community cats bring in kittens for them to play with.

On behalf of my wife and I we would like to offer this letter of support to the team that have set up a new charity in Queenstown to provide care, therapy and resource support to the local cat owner community. Even though QT CATS is a new charity the founding team of Melissa, Andrea, Ginny and Teri have been key members of local animal care charities for longer than the 8 years we've been involved with caring for the local abandoned and unwanted cap population.

The QT CATS team are long time locals and comprehend the problems Queenstown has with a large proportion of the population being transient who still want to have a pet to come home to. They often end up leaving town and their pets are left behind to fend for themselves which means there will always be a necessity for animal care services to pick up the slack. Shortly after moving to Queenstown my wife and I realised this need to give the abandoned pets more of a chance at a longer and safer life so dedicated significant time, effort and funds to animal care charity here.

The difference we see with the QT CATS team are that they have experienced the challenges in volunteering for charities that lose their way and let external factors change the priorities of the charity. This experience and their determination not to deviate from their priorities give us the confidence to contribute to QT CATS in any way we can for as long as we're able. Their collective knowledge cat care, the understanding of the unique challenges of living in Queenstown and their "can do" attitudes make us very confident that any contribution made to QT CATS will be utilised with efficiency and commonsense.

The team at QT CATS also have long term goals of growing their support network to include educational facilities and our elderly population as well as the special needs groups which we applaud them for as it further demonstrates their vision that animal care is more than just leaving out the occasional bowl of food and picking up stray cats after they've been abandoned.

Queenstown is experiencing an economic crisis at the moment and for the foreseeable future and it's always the most vulnerable who are hardest hit by tough times and the pet population will inevitably bear the brunt of household spending cutbacks.
